Sunday Mass

28th July 2024 THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

A reading from the Second Book of Kings 4:42-44

A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing Elisha, the man of God, bread from the first-fruits, twenty barley loaves and fresh grain in the ear. 'Give it to the people to eat,' Elisha said. But his servant replied, 'How can I serve this to a hundred men?' 'Give it to the people to eat' he insisted for the Lord says this, "They will eat and have some over." He served them; they ate and had some over, as the Lord had said.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 144:10-11, 15-18

R. The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs.

All your creatures shall thank you, O Lord, and your friends shall repeat their blessing. They shall speak of the glory of your reign and declare your might, O God.

The eyes of all creatures look to you and you give them their food in due time. You open wide your hand, grant the desires of all who live.

The Lord is just in all his ways and loving in all his deeds. He is close to all who call him, who call on him from their hearts.

Second Reading

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians 4:1-6

I, the prisoner in the Lord, implore you to lead a life worthy of your vocation. Bear with one another charitably, in complete selflessness, gentleness and patience. Do all you can to

preserve the unity of the Spirit by the peace that binds you together. There is one Body, one Spirit, just as you were all called into one and the same hope when you were called. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is Father of all, over all, through all and within all.

A great prophet has appeared among us; God has visited his people. Alleluia!

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 6:1-15

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee - or of Tiberias - and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Today, when account of the feeding of five thousand would have been next in our serial reading of Mark's Gospel, the Lectionary turns instead to John's version. This was done so that the Bread of Life discourse (John 6:22-69) would have a place in the Sunday cycle; it is read over the next four Sundays (as well as in six pericopes on the weekdays of the third week of Easter). Today it is accompanied by the Old Testament antecedent of the feeding from twenty barley loaves at the command of Elisha the prophet. John alone links the feeding to Elisha's story by specifying the use of barley loaves, but all four gospels share with it the references to having some left over after the multitude has eaten. These details in John's Gospel appear to belong to a subplot in which John the Baptist is likened to, but greater than, the prophet Elijah, and Jesus is in some ways likened to, but far greater than, Elijah's successor, Elisha.

When the accounts are all compared, the most notable difference is that Elisha simply commands the food be given to the people: there is no giving thanks (or blessing) or breaking. On this point, something about John's narrative needs to be clarified: too often people say it lacks reference to breaking the loaves, and then creative explanations for this are invented. The simple fact is that John's text alone uses a Greek verb that better translates as *apportion*, covering *both* breaking *and* giving, a verb that corresponds to one not uncommonly used in

Aramaic. Keeping that matter in mind, we should also note that there is no evidence in Hebrew Scripture for a ritual of taking, blessing over and breaking before distributing. In fact there is no reference to praying over food at all, and only one command for blessing (or giving thanks) after eating: Deuteronomy 8:10. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians (11:23-24) and the feedings in the four Gospels and the Last Supper accounts in three are among the earliest witnesses to such a ritual, a fact that has led some to believe that it was invented by Jesus. How-ever, similar descriptions are found among the Dead Sea Scrolls from the century before Christ, and in later but still ancient Jewish literature, the Talmud. These three groups of sources together point to a general Jewish meal ritual as having developed much later than the formulation of the core Hebrew Scriptures.

Delving further into our feeding accounts, other interesting features emerge, too many to cover fully here. Among them we should note that the references to sitting are not direct translations: the Greek refers to reclining. People in the Holy Land by the time of Christ had adopted elements of the Graeco-Roman formal meals, including the posture of reclining. This terminology that belongs to formal meals, such as the Passover (for which the original posture was standing), is strangely out of place in the outdoor setting of our feeding stories. Other features in the broader contexts of each of our feeding accounts also point to the influence of images from the shepherd psalm,

Psalm 23(22). A key one is the grass (which Mark even emphasises was green) upon which they recline. Put together, the many curiosities indicate that these accounts are not simple historical reports; they are multilayered, stylised literary devices. A connection to the Last Supper is found in the literary links of bread, ritual, and the posture of reclining, but a connection to the Eucharist is also made obvious in John's Bread of Life discourse following the feeding. In earliest Christian art, too, the images more commonly used to indicate the Eucharist are not depictions of the Last Supper, but emblems of the loaves and fishes, or of baskets of the leftover bread fragments. Even the institution narrative of our Eucharistic Prayer I borrows the reference to Jesus looking upward before blessing from the Synoptic Gospels' accounts of this feeding.

This overlapping of the feedings and the Eucharist sometimes unsettles people who think it confuses ordinary meals with the sacred one. Perhaps a clue can be taken from the second reading (Eph 4:1-6), where we are urged to preserve the Body's unity in the Spirit by bonds of peace. The meal of the Eucharist is not for anyone; it is for members only. In its celebration the members of the Body remember and express who and what they are—even exchanging the sign of peace with other members of the Body before receiving it in sacramental form. The refreshed and strengthened Body, the Church, may then in each of its members engage in its work in the world, which is directed to everybody.
