

PREPARING FOR THE ASSEMBLY OF THE DIOCESE OF BALLARAT

During the week many gathered at OLHC Wendouree in preparation for the Diocesan Assembly that will focus on Leadership and Governance in a Synodal Church. Parishioners, priests, Religious, St John of God Healthcarers, staff from Catholic schools, CatholicCare, Diocesan Commissions and Councils gathered from Ararat, Ballarat, Ballarat East, Ballarat North, Beaufort, Bungaree, Daylesford, Donald, Gordon, Redan and Wendouree.

Our parish of Ballarat East and Buninyong will now be invited to nominate two delegates to send to the Diocesan Assembly that will be held at Federation University on Friday evening November 15th and Saturday November 16th. Prior to the Assembly, delegates from parishes, clergy, religious, Diocesan Commissions, Boards and Councils, Catholic education, CatholicCare, Catholic organizations and agencies within the Diocese will be required to engage in some preparation (some will be online).

Our Parish Pastoral Council will discern the two delegates who will attend the Diocesan Assembly. Parishioners are invited to nominate other parishioners to be considered to be one of the parish delegates. Please forward your nomination to the Parish Office with the name of the person being nominated, qualities that you see in them that make them a suitable parish delegate and include your name as the parishioner nominating them.

Pope Francis is providing leadership for a synodal Church and the Plenary Council of the Australian Church has recognised that the practice of synodality requires greater transparency in decision making, with the appropriate participation of all the baptised, giving witness to the equal dignity of women and men. The Plenary Council has affirmed a culture of synodality for parishes and dioceses, where healthy and fruitful relationships between clergy and laity "recognise different but complementary charisms and opportunities for co-responsibility", and desire "consultative and collaborative approaches to governance at all levels in the Church." The emphasis on listening and discernment for a synodal Church reveals how the People of God may be more centred on Christ, build healthy and respectful relationships amongst ourselves, and be effective missionary disciples in the Spirit.

The Banquet of Life

Gospel reflection by Veronica Lawson RSM Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In this week's gospel passage, we continue our reflection on John 6. John's gospel was written towards the end of the first century. The Bread of Life discourse probably reflects the interpretation of the gospel writer rather than the actual words of Jesus. This is important for making sense of statements in the discourse that would seem to be out of place from the lips of Jesus during his lifetime. The hearers of these words have lived and worshipped as followers of Jesus for some decades. They have gathered each week for the breaking of the bread and reflected deeply on the mystery of the Word made flesh, the mystery of life in Christ.

If there were eucharistic overtones subtly present in last week's gospel passage (John 6:41-51), they become quite overt as the Johannine Jesus responds to yet another objection from his opponents in this week's gospel.

Like the Israelites of old in the desert wanderings, these people are more than ready to grumble: "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" (6:52).

Jesus does not really respond to the question "How....?" Rather, he goes on to tell those who want to hear that "life" for them depends on their eating his flesh and drinking his blood. The Johannine Jesus uses the present as well as the future tense.

It is well to remember that one never enjoys a banquet along. It is always shared with others who accept the same invitation.

The life they experience in eating his flesh and drinking his blood is a present reality for them as well as a promise of on-going life. For the Israelites, life was in the blood: blood poured out of a person or of an animal meant life poured out. Clearly "life" is being used in John 6 for the quality of life the believers have come to experience through their incorporation into and participation in the community of the baptised, the sort of life that is not destroyed by death.

Life in the community unites the believers intimately with the risen Christ as well as with the God of



Israel whom the Johannine Jesus generally consistently refers to as "Father".

The first reading for today reminds us that other metaphors such as Wisdom were available to those of Jewish heritage for imaging the divine.

Wisdom is a female way of imaging the divine. In John's discourse, Jesus becomes Wisdom extending an invitation to the banquet of life. We keep receiving and accepting that invitation. It is well to remember that one never enjoys a banquet alone. It is always shared with others who accept the same invitation. In the strength of the sustenance we receive in this banquet, we are also invited to bring a quality of life to all beings that struggle to exist, the human and the other-than-human. The potential for this is as boundless as the generosity of our God "enfleshed" in Jesus of Nazareth.
