Sunday Mass

10th November, 2024 THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

A reading from the first book of Kings 17:10-16

Elijah the Prophet went off to Sidon. And when he reached the city gate, there was a widow gathering sticks; addressing her he said, 'Please bring a little water in a vessel for me to drink.' She was setting off to bring it when he called after her. 'Please' he said 'bring me a scrap of bread in your hand.' 'As the Lord your God lives,' she replied 'I have no baked bread, but only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a jug; I am just gathering a stick or two to go and prepare this for myself and my son to eat, and then we shall die.' But Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid, go and do as you have said; but first make a little scone of it for me and bring it to me, and then make some for yourself and for your son. For thus the Lord speaks, the God of Israel:

"Jar of meal shall not be spent, jug of oil shall not be emptied, before the day when the Lord sends rain on the face of the earth."

The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent nor the jug of oil emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 145: 7-10

R. Praise the Lord, my soul!

It is the Lord who keeps faith for ever, who is just to those who are oppressed. It is he who gives bread to the hungry, the Lord, who sets prisoners free.

It is the Lord who gives sight to the blind, who raises up those who are bowed down. It is the Lord who loves the just, the Lord, who protects the stranger.

The Lord upholds the widow and orphan but thwarts the path of the wicked. The Lord will reign for ever, Zion's God, from age to age.

Second Reading

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews 9:24-28

It is not as though Christ had entered a man-made sanctuary which was only modelled on the real one; but it was heaven itself, so that he could appear in the actual presence of God on our behalf. And he does not have to offer himself again and again, like the high priest going into the sanctuary year after year with the blood that is not his own, or else he would have had to suffer over and over again since the world began. Instead of that, he has made his appearance once and for all, now at the end of the last age, to do away with sin by sacrificing himself. Since men only die once, and after that comes judgement, so Christ, too, offers himself only once to take the faults of many on himself, and when he appears a second time, it will not be to deal with sin but to reward with salvation those who are waiting for him.

Gospel Acclamation Matthew 5:3

Alleluia, alleluia! Happy the poor in spirit; the kingdom of heaven is theirs. Alleluia!

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 12: 38-44

In his teaching Jesus said, 'Beware of the scribes who like to walk about in long robes, to be greeted obsequiously in the market squares, to take the front seats in the synagogues and the places of honour at banquets; these are the men who swallow the property of widows, while making a show of lengthy prayers. The more severe will be the sentence they receive.' He sat down opposite the treasury and watched the people putting money into the treasury, and many of the rich put in a great deal. A poor widow came and put in two small coins, the equivalent of a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, 'I tell you solemnly, this poor widow has put more in than all who have contributed to the treasury; for they have all put in money they had over, but she from the little she had has put in everything she possessed, all she had to live on.'

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Between last Sunday's Gospel reading (Mark 12:28-34) and today's (Mark 12:38-44) we miss Jesus contending with the scribes about the identification of the Messiah as Son of David, mentioned two weeks ago in the story of Bartimaeus. It also omits the immediately preceding verse which indicates that the great throng from the Bartimaeus story was still with him. Today Jesus warns about the scribes who, in contrast to Bartimaeus who threw off his himation, like to wear a stolē (a more formal outer garment than the himation) and who, in accord with the favour asked three Sundays ago by James and John, want the seats of honour at feasts. These are not

students nor ministers of the Kingdom (unlike the one from last Sunday's gospel), for they devour the property of widows - apparently a parallel to the rich man four Sundays ago whose wealth had been perhaps gained in fraud. What appears to be merely coincidental in Mark should raise interest, for Mark in his sometimes embarrassing grammatical simplicity is nonetheless a sophisticated short-story teller. While there was promise in that scribe who knows the Law is summed as "Love God and your neighbour" and in blind Bartimaeus who saw and followed, and hope in the disciples who after the resurrection finally get the point and in the rich man's seeking, the scribes in general are of dubious merit; they are the antithesis of what disciples of Jesus are to be. It is one

of the putative victims of their avarice who then provides Mark's next model: the poor widow who contributes two small coins to temple treasury. Others give from their surplus, but she gives from her "life", literally, meaning her living or livelihood. From this it is easy to find the parallel in the story of the prophet Elijah being assisted by the poor widow of Sidon who shares with him her family's meagre rations.

A strikingly similar idea can be read in the second reading, when we look past the influences from the philosophical world of forms: Christ in flesh shares in the whole frailty of humanity, each of whom die only once, and in his divinity he does not share merely from his surplus but he shares the whole of his very life.
