
#### First Reading Zec 9:9-10

## GOSPEL REFLECTION by Greg Sunter

When we hear the term, yoke, we tend to think about the yoke that is used to harness oxen together or the yoke that someone might carry on their shoulder to balance a heavy load. This yoke across the shoulder was adopted into tailoring and so the shoulder piece set into a shirt is also called a yoke. However, in the Jewish tradition there is a completely different meaning to the term. The yoke of a rabbi was his particular interpretation of Torah (the Law); his particular teaching. Disciples who followed a particular rabbi sought to take on his yoke; his particular interpretation. The yoke of any rabbi was best identified by asking him, Which is the greatest commandment?' A rabbi's answer to this question revealed his interpretation of Torah. When Jesus is asked that question, he answers, 'Love God and love your neighbour,' and goes on to say that all of the rest of the Law and the prophets flows on from these two commandments. This is the yoke – the interpretation of Torah – that Jesus taught.

In today's gospel, Jesus calls to him all those who labour and are overburdened. It is the Pharisaic interpretation of the Law that burdens these people. Trying to maintain the Law was burdensome and complicated for the everyday person. Jesus says, 'Shoulder *my* yoke and learn from me ... my yoke is easy.' The yoke of Jesus was easy: Love God and love your neighbour. Compared to the 613 *mitzvot* (commands) set out in the Torah and strictly maintained by the Pharisees, the yoke of Jesus was incredibly easy to understand and adopt. So simple, in fact, that it required a child-like simplicity to accept this yoke.

#### **Historical Context - Jewish education**

Education in Galilee at the time of Jesus was highly valued. From the age of five, all boys and girls studied to memorise in totality the five books of the Torah (the first five books of the Bible). This period of study was called *Beth Sefer*. From about 10-14 they continued studying and memorising the remaining books of scripture (*Beth Talmud*). From about 14 or 15, only the very best students would enter *Beth Midrash* and apply to a rabbi to become his *talmid* – disciple – and seek to take on that rabbi's yoke.

#### Living the Gospel - Shoulder my yoke

Jesus invites us to shoulder his yoke and learn from him for he is gentle and humble in heart. The yoke he invites us to shoulder is the deceptively simple teaching: love God and love your neighbour. To love God is to consciously make a place in our lives for God. The busy spin that tends to be characteristic of so many people's lives today does not allow room for God; does not allow room for prayer and quiet; does not allow room for compassionate response to others. To love God and love our neighbour we must first make room for them.

#### Have you thought? Thank God!

Jesus' quite intimate words to the Father in today's passage carry with them an enormous amount of relief and perhaps released frustration. It is almost a cry of 'Thank God!' for his disciples have finally 'got it'. Jesus blesses the Father for revealing the truth to these simple men whom Jesus had chosen to follow him. The men Jesus chose as disciples were not following another rabbi and so had not been the very best students from their village. They had the education of most children but nothing more — otherwise they would have been following someone else!

- Q. For what is Jesus giving thanks to the Father?
- Q. What advantage do 'mere children' have over the 'learned and the clever'?
- Q. How does this explanation of 'yoke' change your understanding of the passage?
- Q. How might people have reacted to Jesus saying, 'My yoke is easy and my burden light'?
- Q. In what ways do you try to shoulder the yoke of Jesus?

#### **Questions for Adults**

- Q. In what ways do the two halves of today's reading complement each other?
- Q. Why might God have hidden things from 'the learned and the clever'?
- Q. How might we find rest for our souls if we take up the yoke of Jesus?
- Q. What message do you take from today's gospel and reflection?





### Gospel Mt 11:25-30

A reading from the holy
Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus exclaimed, 'I bless you, Father, Lord of heaven



'Come to me, all you who labour and are overburdened, and I will give you rest. Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Yes, my yoke is easy and my burden light.'

#### LOOKING BACK, LOOKING FORWARD

A commonly heard phrase, or rather media cliché, is that after the COVID-19 crisis 'things will never be the same.' It is an understandable sentiment, given the seemingly unprecedented nature of recent events. But how novel is what happened, and how much will actually change?

The creation of what have effectively become police states (in Victoria the army was briefly called in) to counter the effects of a perceived health threat is historically not unique, although the fact that it was implemented across most of the world is novel. That the response was based on modelling projections was also new. Nevertheless, the willingness to sacrifice economic and social stability for a pandemic has happened before; it was common during periods when the Bubonic Plague ravaged populations, for instance. What about the future? Futurist Phil Ruthven has concluded, after looking at 200 years of crises, including

the World Wars, that economies typically return to how they were before. Crises can, however, accelerate trends already occurring.

Differing versions of capitalism are emerging. The contrast between America's re-

sponse to the virus and the measures taken in Australia, Europe and Britain has been stark. America gave its corporations an eye-watering \$US5-10 trillion bailout but did next to nothing for its workforce and small businesses, resulting in extraordinary unemployment and impoverishment.

Other countries, including Australia, spent heavily to protect those adversely affected, especially workers, so as to limit damage to the economic and social fabric. It is a very different conception of how capitalist societies should function, and suggests a significant divergence is occurring.

Another potential trend is a politicisation of health that could undermine basic rights and protections. Health was already out of control in a financial sense. Just the <u>profiteering element</u> in American health is almost the equivalent to two per cent of the global economy and those parasitic practices, fuelled by hyper greed, have spread around the world.

The danger is that the next step will be to replicate what banks have been doing for decades: turning the industry into a system of control. Just as financiers, justified by the circular arguments of neo-liberal economics, have gleefully converted citizens into little more than consumers and debtors, the COVID-19 crisis has revealed a propensity for a biosecurity governance structure that turns citizens into patients, or threats to patients. Any system that does not put the whole person at its centre will inevitably become vicious, no matter how well-meaning it appears to be.

A third likelihood is an unwinding of globalisation. It is looking increasingly likely that the world will split into two: in geo-politics, geo-economics, digital infrastructure and supply chains. America on one side and China on the other. Both countries are in deep financial trouble, although America has an escape hatch because the US dollar remains the world's reserve currency, meaning it can raise new money whenever it wants, and China has a discrete system that can be manipulated from within by the Communist Party.

Another likely development, in this era of contact tracing, is more surveillance. China has moved at lightning pace to implement its Social Credit System, a <u>dystopian mix</u> of artificial intelligence (AI) and mass surveillance. In Western democracies surveillance has mainly been developed and refined by tech giants such as Google and Facebook (Edward Snowden <u>showed</u> that the intelligence services were heavily involved). As these companies become more politicised, using <u>deplatforming</u> or <u>demonetising</u> for alleged violations of 'community standards', the separation between the state and business blurs.

Even more concerning is America's and China's race to advance their respective data collection and Al. Al and surveillance technologies are a Pandora's box. Once they exist, they almost inevitably will be used.
