POPE FRANCIS PRAYS FOR CONVERSION OF TERRORISTS

Pope Francis prayed for the victims of the two recent terror attacks in Dhaka, Bangladesh, and Baghdad, Iraq, and called for the conversion of terrorists, Vatican Radio reports.

The Dhaka attack on a popular restaurant in the diplomatic district of the capital claimed at least

20 lives – many of them foreigners – while the attack in Baghdad's central – and very commercial – Karrada district claimed at least 83 lives, while a second attack on a predominantly Shia neighbourhood of the capital around midnight killed five more people.

"I offer my closeness to the families of all the people killed and wounded in the attack that took place [early Saturday morning] in Dhaka, and in that, which took place [Saturday] in Baghdad," said Pope Francis. "Let us pray together," he continued, "let us pray together for them – for all the dead – and let us ask the Lord to convert the hearts of all those blinded by hatred."

Francis was addressing the faithful gathered in St Peter's Square for the traditional Sunday Angelus prayer. Immediately following his remarks, he led everyone present in reciting the Hail Mary.

Bangladeshi Bishop Gervas Rosario also condemned the Dhaka attack.

"No sane person and no religion can tolerate such a horrendous massacre. Good Muslims now need to take strong stance to save Islam from the grip of terrorism," said Bishop Gervas Rozario, chairman of the Catholic bishops' Justice and Peace Commission.

REFLECTION

It was not enough to want to follow Jesus and to be committed to him. Discipleship also demanded the ability to make shifts in understanding in order to recognise what following Jesus required. He did not merely repeat the religious tradition, he reinterpreted it. We too are called to understand the words and deeds of Jesus, but we must understand what they mean for us today. Today we need to make comparable shifts of understanding in order to bring the message of Jesus into conversation with the contemporary world.

Perhaps one of the most exciting and, at the same time, unnerving aspects of our religious tradition is its nonconforming nature. We think that we finally understand the way God is working in our lives and then something happens that seems to turn our understanding inside out. We are told to love our neighbour and when we ask who that might be we are told a story that turns the question around. 'Who is my neighbor?' or 'Whom should I love?' becomes 'Who acts as a neighbour?' or 'Who shows love?'

The same Sunday that we reflect on the paradoxical nature of the ways of God, we are told that the law of God, which appears to be so lofty, is really very close to us, in our mouths and in our hearts. This too is an unusual claim. Following the law results in a way of living that is inspired and informed by love, love of God and love of others, even, and perhaps especially, those whom we are not inclined to love.

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
