BACKED CONFESSIONAL SEAL

Victoria's top cop backed the right of priests to retain the seal of the confessional over mandatory reporting of child sexual abuse in answers to the inquiry that sparked the child abuse royal commission. Source: *The Australian*.

Victoria Police chief Graham Ashton submit-

ted that police would support priests being able to keep confessional discussions secret, declaring that the force had not identified the rite of the confessional as a barrier to reporting sex abuse allegations. Mr Ashton outlined Victoria Police's position to the Victorian parliamentary inquiry into the handling of child abuse by religious and other organisations in 2012.

Police said yesterday the issue over the Church's canon law and mandatory reporting was a matter for the Victorian government. The government has not yet outlined its final position on matters relating to the seal of the confessional, but has indicated it favours a consistent national response.

The police force said in 2012 that the seal could remain, providing measures were in place to encourage the protection of children. Mr Ashton was then a deputy commissioner in charge of specialist operations and his position is detailed in a document obtained by *The Australian* that backed the so-called Irish model on confession and child protection.

At the time, the Irish model supported retaining the seal of the confessional but encouraging the victim to report offending to a trustworthy adult such as a teacher or relative.

If an abuser were to confess undisclosed abuse to a priest, the priest must advise the penitent to seek professional help, according to Mr Ashton's document.

Under Church law, the seal of the confessional dictates that priests must maintain absolute secrecy about anything that a person confesses.

Child abuse campaigner Hetty Johnston, of Bravehearts, slammed Mr Ashton and the police position, stating that the Church could not be trusted.

"There is absolutely no logical, rational reason for the Church to be outside of this," she said. "This is one country. We need one set of laws that applies to everyone."

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:

The disciples fell into the verbal trap which Jesus set. They believed that market forces should dictate how the hunger of the crowd could be satisfied. It was a young lad who put the disciples to shame, simply handing over five barley loaves and two fish to Jesus. It was because of his generosity that Divine generosity was able to feed the crowd.

Divine desire to satisfy the hungers of humanity for the various necessities of life (food, shelter, companionship, education, medicines) require human generosity. Otherwise, Divine Compassion cannot be effective in the world.

Voluntary renunciation of property and sharing of wealth still occurs in the little oases of monasteries and convents, echoes of the radical redistribution of wealth recorded in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 4:32-35). St Luke makes it clear that this was essentially linked to the Apostles' testifying to the Resurrection 'with great power'.

Francis of Assisi and now Francis of Buenos Aires (Pope Francis) remind us that the Church itself needs to engage in the redistribution of its wealth to enable the hungers of humanity to be satisfied. This will give authenticity to its preaching of the Gospel, and enable its evangelising to be undertaken 'with great power'. We could take a moment to pray that we become more like the little boy in the Gospel, more like Francis of Assisi, more like Francis of Buenos Aires, voluntarily sharing our wealth to satisfy the hungers of humanity.

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
