

We celebrate Confirmation and First Communion with the final group of candidates next Saturday night June 18th. Please pray for them and their families.

Although the journey toward salvation is initiated by God, and everything that we need on that journey is supplied by God, salvation itself is never forced upon us. If we are to be saved, we must first acknowledge our need. If we are to be forgiven, we must first admit our sin. Then no sin, once admitted, is beyond the forgiveness of God. Once we admit our sin we acknowledge God as the source of the grace of salvation. We do not earn our salvation. It is granted to us through faith in Christ, which itself is a gift from God. Here the apparent tension seen in the gospel narrative takes the form of a question: Do we love because we are forgiven or are we forgiven because we first love? We are not forgiven because we love. We are forgiven because we are loved. Repentance may precede forgiveness but even repentance is a grace offered by God. There is no way that we can repay God for the magnanimous mercy shown to us. Gratitude is often expressed through service of others. The repentant woman in today's Gospel was possessed by a desire to serve. Do we realise that the reconciliation with God, which we enjoy, makes us ambassadors of reconciliation for others? Do we do what we can, give what we have to further this ministry?



1st Reading: 2 Samuel 12:7-10. 13 Nathan said to David, 'The Lord the God of Israel says this, "I anointed you king over Israel; I delivered you from the hands of Saul; I gave your masters house to you, his wives into your arms; I gave you the House of Israel and of Judah; and if this were not enough, I would add as much again for you. Why have you shown contempt for the Lord, doing what displeases him? You have struck down Uriah the Hittite with the sword, taken his wife for your own, and killed him with the sword of the Ammonites. So now the sword will never be far from your House, since you have shown contempt for me and taken the wife of Uriah the Hittite to be your wife." David said to Nathan, 'I have sinned against the Lord.' Then Nathan said to David, 'The Lord, for his part, forgives your sin; you are not to die.'

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 31:1-2. 5. 7. Lord, forgive the wrong I have done. Happy the man whose offence is forgiven. whose sin is remitted. O happy the man to whom the Lord imputes no guilt, in whose spirit is no quile.

But now I have acknowledged my sins: my guilt I did not hide. I said 'I will confess my offence to the Lord.' And you, Lord, have forgiven the guilt of my sin.

You are my hiding place, O Lord; you save me from distress. You surround me with cries of deliverance.

Rejoice, rejoice in the Lord, exult,

you just! O come, ring our your joy, all you upright of heart.

Lord, forgive the wrong I have done.

2nd Reading: Galatians 2:16. 19-21 We acknowledge that what makes a man righteous is not obedience to the Law, but faith in Jesus Christ. We had to become believers in Christ Jesus no less than you had, and now we hold that faith in Christ rather than fidelity to the Law is what justifies us, and that no one can be justified by keeping the Law. In other words, through the Law I am dead to the Law, so that now I can live for God. I have been crucified with Christ, and I live now not with my own life but with the life of Christ who lives in me. The life I now live in this body I live in faith: faith in the Son of God who loved me and who sacrificed himself for my sake. I cannot bring myself to give up God's gift; if the Law can justify us, there is no point in the death of Christ.

Acclamation: 1 John 4:10
Alleluia, alleluia! God first loved us and sent his Son to take away our sins. Alleluia!

Gospel: Luke 7:36 - 8:3

One of the Pharisees invited Jesus to a meal. When he arrived at the Pharisee's house and took his place at table, a woman came in, who had a bad name in the town. She had heard he was dining with the Pharisee and had brought with her an alabaster jar of ointment. She waited behind him at his feet, weeping, and her tears fell on his feet, and she wiped them away with her hair; then she covered his feet with kisses and anointed them with the ointment. When

this, he said to himself. 'If this man were a prophet, he would know who this woman is that is touching him and what a bad name she has.' Then Jesus took him up and said, 'Simon, I have something to say to you.' 'Speak, Master,' was the reply. 'There was once a creditor who had two men in his debt; one owed him five hundred denarii, the other fifty. They were unable to pay, so he pardoned them both. Which of them will love him more?' 'The one who was pardoned more, I suppose,' answered Simon. Jesus said, 'You are right.' Then he turned to the woman. 'Simon,' he said, 'you see this woman? I came into your house, and you poured no water over my feet, but she has poured out her tears over my feet and wiped them away with her hair. You gave me no kiss, but she has been covering my feet with kisses ever since I came in. You did not anoint my head with oil, but she has anointed my feet with ointment. For this reason I tell you that her sins, her many sins, must have been forgiven her, or she would not have shown such great love. It is the man who is forgiven little who shows little love.' Then he said to her, 'Your sins are forgiven.' Those who were with him at table began to say to themselves, 'Who is this man, that he even forgives sins?' But he said to the woman, 'Your faith has saved you; go in peace.' Now after this he made his way through towns and villages, preaching, and proclaiming the Good News of the kingdom of God. With him went the Twelve, as well as certain women who had been cured of evil spirits and ailments.. several others who provided for them out of their own resources.

Gospel Reflection - 11th Sunday Yr C. Sr Veronica Lawson rsm



A foot massage is a very intimate experience; children massage the feet of their parents. It is rare, however, in any culture at any time, for a woman to come in off the street, to weep profusely over the feet of a little known man, and to massage his feet with perfumed ointment. So what

is happening in the in today's gospel? What does Luke want to say about Jesus, about the woman, and about Simon the Pharisee who is hosting the dinner where all of this happens? Why does Jesus accept and even affirm such

activity on the part of a woman who is identified as a sinner in the city? This unnamed woman demonstrates that forgiveness sets one free to love in ways that might appear excessive. Unlike Simon, the host, she has already recognised that Jesus is the prophet of God. Simon has little love in his heart: he has not yet experienced the need for forgiveness and fails to recognise God's prophet. Not only does Jesus accept the continuous outpouring of the woman's tears as well as the touch of her hands and her hair on his feet. He actually affirms the goodness of her actions and compares them with Simon's neglect as host. In effect, the woman becomes host to Jesus, offering him the hospitality he has been denied. The story of the

forgiven woman gives way to the story of a group of women who take to the road with Jesus and the 'twelve' and contribute their resources for the sake of the mission. These courageous Galilean women have known the healing power of God. Mary of Magdala has been perfectly healed. She becomes the lead figure in this circle of prophetic women. The women continue in the company of Jesus all the way to Jerusalem, that they witness his death and burial and bring the message of the resurrection to the 'apostles' who refuse to accept their word. They form part of the assembly in the upper room with Mary the mother of Jesus and the rest of the community who pray in expectation of the coming of God's Spirit.

Next Week's Gospel - Luke 9:18-24

One day when Jesus was praying alone in the presence of his disciples he put this question to them, Who do the crowds say I am?' And they answered, 'John the Baptist; others Elijah; and others say one of the ancient prophets come back to life.' 'But you,' he said, 'who do you say I am?' It was Peter who spoke up. 'The Christ of God,' he said. But he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone anything about this. 'The Son of Man', he said, 'is destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and chief priests and scribes and to be put to death, and to be

raised up on the third day.' Then to all he said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross every day and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, that man will save it.'
