Dear Friends,


...They put him on a stone, Aaron took his right hand and kept it up, Hur took his left hand and kept it up, and Moses remained praying until sunset, until the battle was over and won. A story obviously about the power of prayer, and the story Jesus tells us in the gospel seems to teach the same lesson. Luke even remarks before telling it that it is about the need to pray continually and never lose heart

...But when that widow came asking him, praying him again and again, again and again and again to do justice to her, he gave up. He said "I might not be afraid of God or man, but that widow will be my end, she will pester me to death, let me do her justice".

Two stories about the power of prayer, two stories about prayers heard *plus* Jesus' assurance our prayers especially the ones for justice in our terribly unjust world, will be heard.

But those stories are not only about praying. They are not only about the fact that our prayers will be heard, they are also about how our prayers will be heard. While Moses prayed he had to struggle to keep his hand up. God intervened by helping him do that. While Moses prayed the others were fighting in order that justice might be done. These stories are about the necessity to pray, right, they are about the need to persevere in prayer, right, but they are also about the fact that those prayers are going to be heard by us, who are, according to the second reading of today the one from the letter of St Paul to Timothy "fully equipped and ready for any good work".

We need not only to pray, we need to work. ...Fr Joseph Donders

- 2. Witness of extraordinary people of mission;
- 3. theological reflection/formation; and
- 4. Charity.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading: Ex 17:8-13

A reading from the book of Exodus

As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage.

The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. I, meanwhile, will stand on the hilltop, the staff of God in my hand.' Joshua did as Moses told him and marched out to engage Amalek, while Moses and Aaron and Hur went up to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage; when he let his arms fall, the advantage went to Amalek. But Moses arms grew heavy, so they took a stone and put it under him and on this he sat, Aaron and Hur supporting his arms, one on one side, one on the other; and his arms remained firm till sunset. With the edge of the sword Joshua cut down Amalek and his people.

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to Timothy

This is how the people of God become equipped and ready for every good work.

You must keep to what you have been taught and know to be true; remember who your teachers were, and how, ever since you were a child, you have known the holy scriptures – from these you can learn the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and can profitably be used for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives and teaching them to be holy. This is how the man who is dedicated to God becomes fully equipped and ready for any good work.

Before God and before Christ Jesus who is to be judge of the living and the dead, I put this duty to you, in the name of his Appearing and of his kingdom: proclaim the message and, welcome or unwelcome, insist on it. Refute falsehood, correct error, call to obedience – but do all with patience and with the intention of teaching.

Gospel Lk 18:1-8

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke God will see those who cry to him vindicated.

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart. 'There was a judge in a certain town' he said 'who had neither fear of God nor respect for man. In the same town there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, "I want justice from you against my enemy!" For a long time he refused, but at last he said to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for man, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will persist in coming and worry me to death.""

And the Lord said, 'You notice what the unjust judge has to say? Now will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night even when he delays to help them? I promise you, he will see justice done to them, and done speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith on earth?'

The Gospel of the Lord...Praise to You Lord Jesus Christ

Reflection by Greg Sunter

In the gospel of Luke, widows represent the lowly of society. They also are a measure of how the society is travelling. In the Old Testament, God commanded the people to care for widows, orphans and strangers. Widows, in particular, were to be cared for by the whole community. From that point on, the level of compassion within the society could be measured by the care extended to the widows. A number of the prophets point to neglect of the widows as a sign that the community has turned its back on the covenant with God. The gospel of Luke picks up this prophetic tradition and on several occasions uses widows as the key figures in stories or parables.

In this parable, the widow is petitioning her local judge for justice against towards the widow, but the judge fobs her off repeatedly. The widow, knowing that her cause is just, persists and finally wears down the judge.

Another feature of the gospel of Luke is that the lowly and poor – represented here by the widow – are those who recognise their own condition and call on the mercy of God to lift them up. Jesus says that God will see justice done to those who cry out for God's help. Jesus' final comment about finding any faith on earth is a reminder that human beings have a tendency to think they can solve all their own problems and forget that they need God's action in their lives. The faithful in the gospel of Luke are those who know that they are in need of God's mercy and love and call out for it.
