'So you are a king then?' said Pilate. 'It is you who say it' answered Jesus. 'Yes, I am a king. I was

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born for this, I came into the world for this: to bear witness to the truth; and all who are on the side of truth listen to my voice.’

In 2012, a movie about the struggle for religious freedom for the Catholics of Mexico was released called “For Greater Glory.” The rallying cry of the persecuted Mexican believers was Viva Cristo Rey! “Long live Christ the King!” For many of them, these were the last words out of their mouths before their violent deaths.

The example of these martyrs reminds us that, finally, every human being will face Christ the King, the one who will pass final judgment on all that has been done in this life. Such is also the theme for this Sunday’s readings.

In the last Gospel of the Church’s year Jesus come to bear witness to the truth. It’s the truth that in Jesus, God keeps the promise He made to David of an everlasting kingdom, of an heir who would be His Son, “the first born, highest of the kings of the earth”

Today’s Second Reading, taken from the Book of Revelation, quotes these promises and celebrates Jesus as “the faithful witness.” The reading hearkens back to Isaiah’s prophecy that the Messiah would “witness to the peoples” that God is renewing His “everlasting covenant” with David.

But as Jesus tells Pilate, there’s far more going on here than the restoration of a temporal monarchy. In the Revelation reading, Jesus calls Himself “the Alpha and the Omega,” the first

and last letters of the Greek alphabet. He’s applying to Himself a description that God uses to describe Himself in the Old Testament—the first and the last, the One who calls forth all generations (see [Isaiah 41:4](#); [44:6](#); [48:12](#)). Our Responsorial Psalm reminds us that despite the conditions under which we live “The LORD IS king! He IS robed in majesty!” During the Mexican Revolution (1926-1929) and the Spanish Civil War (1936-39) where it was not at all clear if the Church would survive. The saints and martyrs of this time did not give up their confidence in that belief. This is always a cry of faith, not sight, while we sojourn in this “valley of tears.”

The vision of Daniel we hear in today’s First Reading, reinforces this. He comes on “the clouds of heaven”—another sign of His divinity—to be given “glory and kingship” forever over all nations and peoples.

Christ is King and His kingdom, while not of this world, exists in this world, in the Church. We are a royal people. We know we have been loved by Him and freed by His blood and transformed into “a kingdom, priests for his God and Father”. As a priestly people, we share in His sacrifice and in His witness to God’s everlasting covenant. We belong to His truth and listen to His voice, waiting for Him to come again amid the clouds.
