Bishop Paul Bird has informed Fr Peter that the Diocese will not be renewing the agreement we have with the Baptistine Sisters for Sr Manuela and Sr Tirsa.

When the current agreement concludes on October 6th, Sr Manuela will return to the Philippines.

It was with deep sadness I told this to the Parish Council Meeting on Thursday night. Bishop Paul said their visa Required that we support them with full-time positions. The Diocese will not be able to continue this agreement.

Bishop Paul writes: "I am very grateful to you and to the Horsham Parish Community for the welcome you have given to the Sisters. Your personal encouragement and that of parishioners has been important for Sr Tirsa and Sr Manuela in their service as a Baptistine community in our midst. Sadly, we will not be able to sustain positions for the Sisters beyond the present agreement. After Sr Tirsa needed to return to the Philippines for health reasons, Sr Manuela has done very well in adapting to life without a Baptistine companion."

May the current pandemic restrictions be lifted enough for us to have a fitting farewell to Sr Manuela. I thank Manuela for all she does.

Making Connections: Keys are a symbol of authority. Jesus says to Peter, 'I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven.' Jesus entrusts his authority to Peter, and to successive Popes. This authority must be used with wisdom and compassion and with it comes responsibility. The crossed keys are part of the emblem of the Pope.

Did you Know?: The great stone temple built by Herod was at a natural spring which is the source of the Jordan River. It was here that Jesus told Peter, that he would be a rock on which the church is built, dedicated to the one God

Marriage Tip: Kids are one of the joys of marriage (much of the time). But they take their time off the top of your energy reserve. You aren't married to your kids so don't let them substitute for the intimacy you owe each other.

Daily Prayer: God, well-spring of all wisdom and font of every insight, you inspired Simon Peter to confess Jesus as the Messiah, the Son of the living God, and on the rock of this faith you built your church. Pour out your Spirit in abundance, that all may join in this profession, and so become living stones built up into your church, standing firm upon the one foundation, our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son.

Vocation View: As Christians we are called to see those in authority use their power as service and love.

21st Sunday: St. Paul reminds the Romans, and us, that all things come from God: "For from Him and through Him and for Him all things are." Good stewards understand that all is gift and share generously gifts of time, talent, and treasure with which they've been blessed.

"Today's readings highlight two different but related themes: the character of our understanding of Christ, and our understanding of discipleship that flows from it." So what would Jesus be doing if he was in our parish now? What if the lockdown goes for months or a year? It's been nearly six months to date. The AFL is wondering whether it won't start next year's season until May! What if we're restricted to our 10's and 20's until Christmas or May or ..? Just wondering. Make sure you survive that long. Mask up!

First Reading: Isaiah 22:19-23

Thus says the Lord of hosts to Shebna, the master of the palace: I dismiss you from your office, I remove you from your post, and the same day I call on my servant Eliakim son of Hilkiyah. I invest him with your robe, gird him with your sash, entrust him with your authority; and he shall be a father to the inhabitants of Jerusalem and to the House of Judah. I place the key of the House of David on his shoulder; should he open, no one shall close, should he close, no one shall open. I drive him like a peg into a firm place; he will become a throne of glory for his father's house.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 137:1-3, 6, 8

Lord, your love is eternal; do not forsake the work of your hands.

I thank you, Lord, with all my heart, you have heard the words of my mouth. Before the angels I will bless you, I will adore before your holy temple.

I thank you for your faithfulness and love which excel all we ever knew of you. On the day I called, you answered; you increased the strength of my soul.

The Lord is high yet he looks on the lowly and the haughty he knows from afar. Your love, O Lord, is eternal, discard not the work of your hands.

Second Reading: Romans 11:33-36

How rich are the depths of God - how deep his wisdom and

knowledge - and how impossible to penetrate his motives or understand his methods! Who could ever know the mind of the Lord? Who could ever be his counsellor? Who could ever give him anything or lend him anything? All that exists comes from him; all is by him and for him. To him be glory for ever! Amen.

Gospel Acclamation: Matthew 16:18

Alleluia, alleluia! You are Peter, the rock on which I will build my Church; the gates of hell will not hold out against it. Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew 16:13-20

When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say he is John the Baptist, some Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he said, 'who do you say I am?' Then Simon Peter spoke up, 'You are the Christ,' he said, 'the Son of the living God.' Jesus replied, 'Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. So I now say to you: You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church. And the gates of the underworld can never hold out against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.' Then he gave the disciples strict orders not to tell anyone that he was the Christ.

Gospel Reflection: SunAOrd21 Veronica Lawson rsm:

"Be yourself. Everybody else is taken", sings Melinda Schneider. The lyrics of this song, composed for Melinda's dying father, affirm some fairly obvious truths. Even though we know that "everybody else is taken", most of us spend energy trying to measure up to other peoples' expectations and fail to be truly ourselves. In our self-absorption, we can also misread others and fail to know them as they are. Being accepted as we are is among the most precious of gifts. Jesus knew this. He was utterly true to himself and he allowed others time to discover for themselves his real identity and the nature of his mission. If the mission was to succeed, then his followers needed to look beyond their preconceptions about him and accept him as God's anointed one, as the revelation of the living God. Jesus' true identity is a key issue for Matthew's community as it is for us. From the outset, he is presented as the anointed one of God, the Messiah or Christ. Before his birth, the reader knows him as "Emmanuel", God with us. What the narrator asserts at the outset, certain characters in the story come to understand. Jesus' fearless teaching and his healing ministry bring the crowd to recognise him as a prophet in the tradition of Elijah or Jeremiah or John the Baptist, and as the incarnate Wisdom of God. The power of God at work in Peter leads him

to a deeper understanding of Jesus' identity. Peter has faltered in the past and will falter again, even to the point of denying any knowledge of or association with Jesus. He finally arrives at deep insight, however, and proclaims his faith in Jesus as both Christ or Messiah and son of the living God. Insight is a gift, and God can work wherever there is openness and goodwill. Peter has both in abundance. He is declared "blessed" on account of this gift of insight, and entrusted with the "keys" of God's empire. The specific power of binding and loosing that is given to Peter is subsequently given to the community of disciples (18:18) where the saying is framed on the one hand by instructions about dealing with transgressors and on the other by the assertion that where two or three are gathered in the name of Jesus, he is there in their midst. "Binding and loosing" belongs to all who gather in the name of Jesus whom Matthew presents as God-with-us, as prophet and Wisdom, as the Christ and as the revelation of the living God. The exercise of the power "to bind and to loose" demands the same wisdom and insight as does the capacity to recognise and affirm the true identity of Jesus. Gathering in the name of Jesus is a challenge right now as we face the restrictions required to deal with pandemic. We pray for the wisdom to find new ways of being church and of truly dealing with transgression.

Next Week's Gospel: Matthew 16:21-27

Jesus began to make it clear to his disciples that he was destined to go to Jerusalem and suffer grievously at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, to be put to death and to be raised up on the third day. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. 'Heaven preserve you, Lord,' he said. 'This must not happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God's way but man's.' Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it. What, then, will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life? For the Son of Man is going to come in the glory of his Father with his angels, and, when he does, he will reward each one according to his behaviour.'
