First Reading

Job 38:1. 8-11

A reading from the book of Job.

From the heart of the tempest the Lord gave Job his answer. He said: Who pent up the sea behind closed doors when it leapt tumultuous out of the womb, when I wrapped it in a robe of mist and made black clouds its swaddling bands; when I marked the bounds it was not to cross and made it fast with a bolted gate? Come thus far, I said, and no farther: here your proud waves shall break.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 106:23-26. 28-31. R. v.1

- (R.) Give thanks to the Lord, his love is everlasting.
- 1. Some sailed to the sea in ships to trade on the mighty waters. These men have seen the Lord's deeds, the wonders he does in the deep. (R.)
- 2. For he spoke; he summoned the gale, tossing the waves of the sea up to heaven and back into the deep; their soul melted away in their distress. (R.)
- 3. Then they cried to the Lord in their need and he rescued them from their distress. He stilled the storm to a whisper: all the waves of the sea were hushed. (R.)
- 4. They rejoiced because of the calm and he led them to the haven they desired. Let them thank the Lord for his love, the wonders he does for men. (R.)

Second Reading 2 Corinthians 5:14-17

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the Corinthians.

The love of Christ overwhelms us when we reflect that if one man has died for all, then all men should be dead; and the reason he died for all was so that living men should live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised to life for them. From now onwards, therefore, we do not judge anyone by the standards of the flesh. Even if we did once know Christ in the flesh, that is not how we know him now. And for anyone who is in Christ, there is a new creation; the old creation has gone, and now the new one is here.

Gospel Mark 4:35-41

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark. With the coming of evening, Jesus said to his disciples, 'Let us cross over to the other side.' And leaving the crowd behind they took him, just as he was, in the boat; and there were other boats with him. Then it began to blow a gale and the waves were breaking into the boat so that it was almost swamped. But he was in the stern, his head on the cushion, asleep. They woke him and said to him, 'Master, do you not care? We are going down!' And he woke up and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, 'Quiet now! Be calm!' And the wind dropped, and all was calm again. Then he said to them, 'Why are you so frightened? How is it that you have no faith?' They were filled with awe and said to one another, 'Who can this be? Even the wind and the sea obey him.'

In the lead-up to the Jubilee Year, Pope Francis has asked that 2024 be marked as a Year of Prayer, to promote the centrality of individual and community prayer. The Dicastery for Evangelisation has made some useful resources available to help people to better understand and rediscover the value of prayer. In addition to the 38 catecheses on Prayer that Pope Francis himself presented, a series of booklets entitled, "Notes on Prayer" is being published by the Vatican publishing house. The eight titles are designed to put the need for a profound relationship with the Lord back at the centre of people's lives, through the many forms of prayer to be found in the rich Catholic tradition of prayer. In addition, a pastoral aid is available online, in a digital version, to help parish communities, families, priests, cloistered nuns and young people to become more aware of the need for daily prayer. The new holy water font, made by James McMurtrie of Pomonal, was blessed last Sunday and filled by Oscar Erwin, who celebrated his Confirmation and First Eucharist.

Pipe Organ Stawell – The pipe organ in Stawell will be tuned next week. It is twelve months since it was last tuned. While it's not being played the cost of tuning is questionable.

Pipe Organ Ararat - The organ in Ararat has not been tuned and at present is not playable. Attached is a photo of the corrosion that is in some of the mechanisms. We

are told that the cost of replacing the corroded parts will be about \$20,000. In my ten years in Ararat we have spent about \$10,000 on tuning and insurance. To fix the corroded parts would take to cost to \$30,000 over ten years, having played the organ at Mass three times, or \$10,000 per Mass. We are told that organ is worth very little to sell.

Why? Because no parish will shell out substantial money these days for a pipe organ. We have been offered \$5,000. That feels almost



like giving it away. For now, we don't know what to do, but spending \$20,000 to fix an organ we don't use seems a poor decision.

Reflection by Jenny Close

Jesus' ability to control the raging sea proves his stature as the Christ of creation: all the forces of nature have their origin in Christ. The calming of the waters is a fine metaphor for Jesus' mission of redemption, that is, overcoming the destructive forces of sin and death in the whole of creation. In this gospel narrative, Jesus is showing that he has the power and authority to do just that.

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate - The Voice which Accompanies to the Other Side

Every element of the universe, even the most destructive, is listening for the voice of Our Lord, "Quiet, be still." In this Gospel story, the waters of chaos respond to the voice of the Lord of all creation, allowing Jesus to accompany his disciples to the other side of the Sea of Galilee. We all know of times when chaos storms into our life, when we feel we are being swamped whether from outside or from some part of our own

personality. Some part of our life is facing death. We may cry out to Jesus "Don't you care?". He will come to accompany us but always to "the other side". Our Lord does not indulge the fantasy of "turning back the clock". We have to keep rowing in a new direction. There is no nostalgic return to the old situation. We may well feel displaced, disoriented, but Our Lord is our companion in the unfamiliar situation we have reached. We could take a moment to pray for Our Lord to help us in all life-threatening situations, especially in the final transit through the wrenching chaos of death. May we hear him rebuke the Prince of Darkness and Death: "Quiet, be still" as he accompanies us to the other side, to the promised land of Heaven.
