Reading for the next Sunday

1st Reading: Jeremiah 31:7-9 2nd Reading: Hebrews 5:1-6 Gospel: Mark 10:46-52 Dear Friends, In today's gospel, Mark presents the disciples' ignorance about Jesus' kingdom. The two disciples who put the question do not seem to understand what the following of Jesus demands. They see Jesus as the Messiah with a political agenda. And even after Jesus has hinted three times about his passion and death, they still do not understand that their Master will suffer and die in Jerusalem. This is demonstrated clearly in the request of the brothers James and John for the two most important positions when Jesus sits in glory. They probably thought that Jesus will replace the Roman power with his own kingdom. It is not only the two brothers who yearn or positions of power but also the rest of the Twelve as well. The evangelist Mark tells us that the other ten become indignant at James and John. Jesus uses the occasion into an opportunity to teach them about authority and greatness. The rulers among the Gentiles lord it over their subjects. Such is the case of the emperor and the governors. The Roman citizens rule over Israelites. Even the religious leaders in Israel love to sit on "the Chair of Moses" and receive salutations from the people. But it is different with Jesus. He who is their Master has not come to be served but to serve. His only agenda is to serve the people and to save them. He is willing to pay the price for it, to undergo his suffering and death on the cross to attain salvation to all. In today's celebration let us ask the Lord to give us the power of the Holy Spirit to understand the teaching of Jesus and to follow his examples in our day-to-day life.

Gospel: Mark 10:35-45

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

The Son of Man came to give his life as a ransom for all.

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus. 'Master,' they said to him, 'we want you to do us a favour.' He said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' They

said to him, 'Allow us to sit one at your right hand and the other at your left in your glory.' 'You do not know what you are asking' Jesus said to them. 'Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?' They replied, 'We can.' Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I must drink you shall drink, and with the baptism with which I must be baptised you shall be baptised, but as for seats at my right hand or my left, these are not mine to grant; they belong to those to whom they have been allotted.' When the other ten heard this they began to feel indignant with James and John, so Jesus called them to him and said to them: 'You know that among the pagans their so-called rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt. This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord. All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA.

When we set out to follow Jesus, faithful to the promises that we made at baptism to renounce sin and live lives directed by the Spirit, we normally do so with generosity of heart. However, after we have borne the burdens of this decision and realise some of the implications of our commitment, we begin to wonder if it was worth it. We believe that God will generously bless us. Still, would it be so wrong to hope for a little more, especially if we have made significant sacrifices along the way?

Of those to whom much has been given, much will be required in return. The closer we are to Jesus, the more we will be expected to mirror him. The great ones in the reign of God, the ones who exercise authority over others, must be the servants of the rest. Parents, teachers, civil authorities, managers of every kind, pastoral leaders must all be servants, as Jesus was a servant. We will also have to drink from his cup of suffering and be baptised into his death. As we draw close to the one who gave his life as an offering for sin, we will find that the same self-sacrifice is being asked of us. When we struggle with the misfortunes that we face because of our commitment to Jesus, we will have him as an inspiration and a model to follow. He can sympathise with our weaknesses, identify with our suffering. We can draw strength from his example and hope from his kindness.
