Dear friends,

Jesus starts his public ministry in Galilee after John the Baptist had been arrested. His first appeal to the people is to repent and believe in the gospel. With this call to conversion and change of heart Jesus invites people to turn towards God. It is also a call to follow him, to be fishers of men, to be part of his ministry. For this reason he calls four men to be his disciples. They were fishermen and left their boats and nets and followed him. When Jesus called them, they didn't speak a word and followed Jesus. But their action spoke for them, they left everything behind and followed Jesus.

These men were not men of great theological education with wide social influence or with impressive social background. Yet Jesus chooses them to be with him and to work for him later. He calls very ordinary people like you and me and moulds us to work for his kingdom. Hence the work of Jesus is not solely in the hands of the people the world considers great and famous, but ourselves through the hand of God. So God is inviting ordinary people like us who are willing to give God our life, time and talents for the kingdom. Then He will make them fit to work for his kingdom. Today, as we reflect the call of Jesus, let us take our call of Baptism seriously and to be a witness to Jesus and his kingdom in our day-to-day life. - Neville

## LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading: Jon 3:1-5. 10

A reading from the prophet Jonah

The Ninevites renounced their evil ways.

The word of the Lord was addressed to Jonah: 'Up!' he said 'Go to Nineveh, the great city, and preach to them as I told you to.' Jonah set out and went to Nineveh in obedience to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was a city great beyond compare: it took three days to cross it. Jonah went on into the city, making a day's journey. He preached in these words, 'Only forty days more and Nineveh is going to be destroyed.' And the people of Nineveh believed in God; they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least.

God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behaviour. And God relented: he did not inflict on them the disaster which he had threatened.

As he was walking along by the Sea of Galilee he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net in the lake – for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you into fishers of men.' And at once they left their nets and followed him.

Going on a little further, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they too were in their boat, mending their nets. He called them at once and, leaving their father Zebedee in the boat with the men he employed, they went after him.

### REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

When Jesus says to Simon, Andrew, James and John 'I will make you into fishers of men', then, amongst the many levels of meaning they would have heard the allusion to Ezekiel 29:3-5.

Jesus was telling them that he was creating a society of liberated human beings, called the 'Kingdom of God'. This would involve struggle against powerful elites, the pharaohs of this world, who oppress and enslave people. It would be as dangerous and demand as much energy as required to haul a crocodile out of the Nile.

Yet they did so, 'straightaway'. Because of the call of Jesus? No. At least, not that alone. We read 'He saw Simon and his brother Andrew . . . He saw James and his brother John.' They were responding not to his voice alone but to his eyes. His is like the attentive gaze of a parent loving a baby into a beautiful future. Jesus looks at you and at me wanting to love us into a barely imaginable future.

We could pause for a moment to remember that when His call comes, demanding an 'aye' or a 'nay', the Eyes have it.
