Mark Yates and Stephen Parnis, both past presidents of the Australian Medical Association Victoria, yesterday sounded the alarm on the new laws, arguing they will pressure vulnerable Australians into taking their own lives, diminish the delivery of effective palliative care and involve the "falsification" of death certificates. The warning coincides with the commencement this morning of a three-day conference in Melbourne to explain the implementation of assisted dying legislation, which takes effect on June 19.

Dr Yates – a geriatrician and clinical associate professor at Deakin University who was AMA Victoria president from 2005 to 2007 – told The Australian the assisted dying laws were "still perceived by clinicians to be unethical" and that "expert palliative care" could almost always meet the needs of those nearing the end of their lives.

"Lots of patients express the wish to die at the very end of their life, which is symptomatic of the fact that their needs aren't being met," Dr Yates said.

"If we had appropriate palliative care, then all of those needs could be met ... expert palliative care can almost always remedy that."

He attacked the Victorian laws for requiring death certificates to state-assisted suicides be recorded as deaths caused by the underlying terminal illness, suggesting this was an attempt

John Buchanan, a senior psychiatrist who has worked in palliative medicine, argued the legislation lacked "adequate safeguards." He warned that, under the legislation, the "cause of death is basically falsified".

to "sanitise" the truth.

Stephen Parnis said he believed many people managing terminal illnesses would seek out assisted suicide because they did not want to be a burden.

"The fact is that we have some very vulnerable people in our society whose next of kin or nearest and dearest may regard them as an asset to be realised rather than someone who needs to be loved," he said.

Sunday, 19 May 2019: Fifth Sunday of Easter - Year C Liturgy of the Word

First Reading Acts 14:21-27 A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They assembled the church and gave an account

of all that God had done with them.

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.

## Have you thought? Love

I love my dog! I love your hair! I love that new song! I absolutely love chocolate! We throw around the word 'love' so casually today that it has almost lost its meaning. The decision whether or not to say 'I love you' in a relationship has become a major dilemma — or alternatively, just the formula that has to be said to get what you want! Jesus did not use the word so casually or so inappropriately. He spoke of love very deliberately and very specifically. Jesus calls us to share in the selfless love that he modelled and to follow his example.

#### Gospel Focus – God's Love

What does it mean to love as Jesus loved? The love Jesus poured out to all was an expression of God's love that has been poured out to all creation since the very beginning and continues to be poured out to-day. God's love doesn't keep score. When humankind turned its back on God, God's love continued to call them back to faithful relationship. God's love is not conditional – whatever we do, God continues to love us. There is no barrier that we can construct that God's love cannot get around. It is this sort of love that the new commandment demands of us.

#### Living the Gospel - Love is all around

Love surrounds us all the time. It is impossible to turn on a radio without hearing 'love' used in one way or another. Love is the most common theme of songs, poetry, literature and art. Although we might bemoan the casual use of 'love', the fact remains that we fill our lives with the sounds and images of love. It's easier to imagine the all-pervasive nature of God's love when we recognise just how pervasive the commercial and artistic expressions of love have become. As Christian people, the challenge that faces us is to imbue these expressions with a richer, deeper notion of love.

Extraordinary Ministers, part of your duty is to clean the Sacred Vessels in the sacristy after Mass and prepare them for the next Mass—fill wine and water cruets, etc.

Put filled cruets in the fridge.

Scripture Reader and Extraordinary Ministers are meant to process with the priest at the start and end of Mass. Reader Carries the Lectionary to the Sanctuary at the start of Mass, but does not carry it out at the end.

ALL MINISTERS SHOULD TRY TO BE AT THE CHURCH AT LEAST TEN MINUTES BEFORE MASS AND ADVISE THE PRIEST THAT YOU ARE THERE. THIS GIVES HIM TIME TO ARRANGE A SUBSTITUTE IF THAT HAS NOT ALREADY BEEN DONE.
