

I wish for every parishioner and visitor to our parish this weekend a wonderful Easter. I'm writing this on Holy Thursday morning and it's all happening! The smell of roast lamb is filling the house and office. The sweet apple and walnut haroses is ready and the bitter herbs. The three millennia old Jewish prayers are printed and ready. The Passover (Seder) meal will be a beautiful preparation for the Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper tonight. Just now the funeral booklet for Peter Upton is printing. What a great day to be buried, the day before Good Friday. Judy is grieving her husband. Sawyer Thomas Jackson is to be baptised on Sunday. His certificate is ready. Families are coming home from the school holidays. Travel safely people. These are all important things for people and families. Across our desks this morning Joyce and I have been talking about how fulfilling our work is. For me, I love it, and hope that is obvious. I hope that I'm giving parishioners a lot to think about. I hope that the Good Friday Passion transports you to Jerusalem, that you can imagine being there, the sights, the smells, the noise, the dust, the terror of being caught up in a brewing crucifixion. I hope that you wonder how on earth the tomb came to be empty on Sunday morning. I hope that you never forget the look on Mary of Magdala's face. I hope that you all find the whole Church thing both baffling and enlivening. I do. Happy Easter!

So how about we embrace the shepherds, (the bible time social outcasts) the broken shepherds, the poor shepherds, the Muslim shepherds, the shepherds on Manus Island, the same sex attracted shepherds, the twice married shepherds, the shepherds making chocolate for slavery wages etc., anyone and everyone who feels dudded. And remember, Mary started it all when she welcomed the Shepherds before all others into the stable. That's why the symbol appears during the Hail Mary. What do you think of the new symbol?
