Pope Francis asks the faithful to join him in prayer for the many displaced people who are fleeing wars

Pope Francis on Sunday expressed his sorrow for the plight of refugees and migrants fleeing war and asked the faithful to pray for them.

"I am saddened by the news of so many displaced people, so many men, women and children who are discarded by war," he said during the Angelus in St. Peter's Square.

He said his thoughts go to the hundreds of thousands of migrants seeking refuge and help throughout the world, and noting that there is much in the news about them in these days, the Pope said: "Let us pray for them."

Pope Francis' appeal for prayers comes as hundreds of migrants are reportedly headed through permeable borders to Greece from Turkey, and thousands more are gathered on the Turkish side seeking entry after Ankara relaxed curbs on their movement.

At least 500 people had arrived by sea on three Greek islands close to the Turkish coast within a few hours on Sunday morning.

On the mainland further north, groups waded across a river to the Greek side. Reuters reporters said they included an Afghan mother with a five-day-old infant. Turkey said on Thursday it would no longer restrain hundreds of thousands of asylum seekers in its territory from reaching Europe despite an agreement to do so reached with the EU in 2016. Its announcement triggered an almost instant rush to the borders it shares with European Union member Greece.

Pastoral Statement from the Vicar—General **Kevin Malonev**

As you are aware the spread of the coronavirus COVID-19, continues to present health challenges around the world, including here in Australia. Hence it has been necessary to temporarily alter certain practices in the Mass to ensure the health and safety of parishioners. The following directives are to be immediately enacted:

- In those parishes where Holy Communion is distributed under both kinds (Hosts and Chalice), this practice to cease. Communion to be received in the hand not on the tongue.
- At the Sign of Peace, parishioners with coughs and sneezes, the vulnerable and those parishioners who may feel uncomfortable about shaking hands at the Sign of Peace, may wish to exchange the peace of Christ with a smile or a bow, and should be encouraged to do so.
- All Ministers of Holy Communion (both ordinary and extraordinary) are to use hand sanitisers before the distribution of Holy Communion commences, and are not to physically touch anyone in the act of blessing.
- Holy water fonts are to be emptied or removed.

These directives are informed by the latest advice from the Australian Government Department of Health which states everyone should practice good hygiene to protect against coronavirus infection.

Everyone is encouraged to monitor local and national health advice, and to practice good hygiene, including washing hands in soap and water.

The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah – that is, Christ – is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.' 'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in him on the strength of the woman's testimony, so, when the Samaritans came up to him, they begged him to stay with them.
