First Reading

A reading from the book of Exodus

I will rain bread from heaven upon you.

The whole community of the sons of Israel began to complain against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness and said to them, 'Why did we not die at the Lord's hand in the land of Egypt, when we were able to sit down to pans of meat and could eat bread to our hearts content! As it is, you have brought us to this wilderness to starve this whole company to death!'

Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Now I will rain down bread for you from the heavens. Each day the people are to go out and gather the day's portion; I propose to test them this way to see whether they will follow my law or not.'

'I have heard the complaints of the sons of Israel. Say this to them, "Between the two evenings you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have bread to your hearts content. Then you will learn that I, the Lord, am your God." And so it came about: quails flew up in the evening, and they covered the

camp; in the morning there was a coating of dew all round the camp. When the coating of dew lifted, there on the surface of the desert was a thing delicate, powdery, as fine as hoarfrost on the ground. When they saw this, the sons of Israel said to one another, 'What is that?' not knowing what it was. 'That' said Moses to them 'is the bread the Lord gives you to eat.'

Cont. from the back → The Israelites too, were content to follow God so long as there was plenty of food. The Manna in the wilderness, like the bread Jesus multiplied for the crowd, was a sign of God's Providence – that we should trust that he will provide. These signs pointed to their fulfilment in the Eucharist. This is the food that God longs to give us. This is the bread we should be seeking. But too often we don't ask for this bread. Instead, we seek the perishable stuff of our everyday wants and anxieties. In our weakness we think these things are what we really need. We must trust God more.

News on Father Matt: You may have heard already that on Wednesday afternoon Fr Matthew suffered a heart attack. He was flown to Melbourne that evening, a stent was inserted Thursday morning, and he is now recovering well. He has received a great many messages from parishioners, and he thanks you all for your support and prayers. At the moment he is still in hospital, recovering well, but needs strict rest for a few weeks. Please keep him in your prayers.

114 years ago cont. In 1954 the Mothers'Club was formed with 34 members. President was Mrs Tobin, Secretary Mrs Dillon and Treasurer Mrs P. O'Callaghan went straight to work raising money to help bring improvements to the school and convent. The monthly tuckshop began along with afternoon teas and a Christmas fair the proceeds from which helped fund a school library, sporting equipment, 3 water bags – no bubblers yet, dance records and many other necessary items such as brooms and a fire extinguisher, all of which improved school life.

Eventually a lawn was planted and hoses and sprinklers were provided to bring a patch of green to what could have otherwise been a dustbowl. By 1956, there were 50 members of the Mothers' Club and the first Children's Ball was held, followed by an Operetta. Fans, a sewing machine and a lawn mower were bought from the Mothers' Club profits as well as timber for two shelter sheds which the men erected.

In 1956 building also began on Our Lady Help of Christian's church in Patchewollock. After many years of using the Hall and the much travelled "Mass Box" the parishioners decided the time was right to have their own church and permanent altar. By the May of 1957 Bishop J.P. O'Collins was there to bless and open the brand new church which, due to the hard work and generosity of the local families was paid for in a short time. A building bug hit the region with Our Lady of Fatima church in Underbool completed, blessed and opened on the 30th of November 1958, by Bishop O'Collins. The church was built on an allotment owned by Mr Joe Gloster and the cost of the church was £8,400. Working bees, sowing crops and direct giving saw that it was debt free at the time of opening, a testament to the dedication of the local parishioners.
