THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

A reading from the prophet Isaiah 60: 1-6

Arise, shine out Jerusalem, for your light has come, the glory of the Lord is rising on you, though night still covers the earth and darkness the peoples.

Above you the Lord now rises and above you his glory appears. The nations come to your light and kings to your dawning brightness.

Lift up your eyes and look round: all are assembling and coming towards you, your sons from far away and daughters being tenderly carried

At this sight you will grow radiant, your heart throbbing and full; since the riches of the sea will flow to you; the wealth of the nations come to you; camels in throngs will cover you, and dromedaries of Midian and Ephah; everyone in Sheba will come, bringing gold and incense and singing the praise of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 72: 1-2, 7-8, 10-13

R. Lord, every nation on earth will adore you.

Give the king your justice, O God, and your righteousness to a king's son. May he judge your people with righteousness, and your poor with justice.

In his days may righteousness flourish and peace abound, until the moon is no more. May he have dominion from sea to sea, and from the River to the ends of the earth.

May the kings of Tarshish and of the isles render him tribute, may the kings of Sheba and Seba bring gifts. May all kings fall down before him, all nations give him service.

For he delivers the needy when they call, the poor and those who have no helper. He has pity on the weak and the needy, and saves the lives of the needy.

R. Lord, every nation on earth will adore you.

Second Reading

A reading from St Paul to the Ephesians 3:2-3, 5-6

You have probably heard how I have been entrusted by God with the grace he meant for you, and that it was by a revelation that I was given the knowledge of the mystery. This mystery that has now been revealed through the Spirit to his holy apostles and prophets was unknown to any men in past generations; it means that pagans now share the same inheritance, that they are parts of the same body, and the same promise has been made to them, in Christ Jesus, through the gospel.

Gospel Acclamation Matthew 2:2

Alleluia, alleluia! We have seen his star in the East; and have come to adore the Lord. Alleluia!

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 2:1-12

After Jesus had been born at Bethlehem in Judaea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. 'Where is the infant king of the Jews?' they asked. 'We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage.' When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 'At Bethlehem in Judaea,' they told him 'for this is what the prophet wrote:

And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah, for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel.'

Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. 'Go and find out all about the child,' he said 'and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage.' Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, and returned to their own country by a different way.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

We've all had one or two of those 'epiphany' moments in our life – those mystical events when there was a sudden enlightenment, a lightbulb moment, that gave us a fresh and even refreshing view of things that previously may have been elusive.

The Cambridge English Dictionary defines epiphany as a <u>moment</u> when you <u>suddenly feel</u> that you <u>understand</u>, or <u>suddenly become conscious</u> of something that is very <u>important</u> to you.

But what is 'The Epiphany' of today's gospel? What are we celebrating and why are we celebrating it? After all, Jesus was born in a tiny village from which his ancestor David originally hailed, was initiated into the Jewish religion as was the custom, moved with his parents back to a sleepy village in Israel's northern province of Galilee; grew up under their direction and guidance and became relatively well-known – for better or for worse – around the district only in the last three years of his life. Not at all like the definition of epiphany from the Cambridge dictionary!

So what of this 'Epiphany' with a capital E?

Today's Gospel records the events surrounding

the visit to the newborn Jesus of three wise people

from outside the Jewish tradition. They are often referred to as 'magi' – that is, people who interpret-

ed dreams, dabbled in magic and astrology (hence

why they may have been following the star) but

who believed in the notion of one god – sort of oriental monotheistic 'wizards'!

Christian tradition has assigned the names Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar to them. They ostensibly came from the east, possibly from regions such as Persia (Iran) or Iraq. Art and even Christmas cards depict each of them for the most part in different cultural clothing, thus representing the Gentile world in all its diversity.

Inspired by the wise men's gifts to the Holy Child in his first 'home' – the stable - many families today follow an old tradition of marking with chalk the front door of their homes with the symbols 20 + C + M + B + 25. This is meant as a blessing for the new year: the year 2025 bookending the initial of each of the three wise men and featuring the cross. The letters could also be read as abbreviations of the Latin

phrase *Christus Mansionem Benedicat – May Christ bless this house.* This is certainly a way that we in our homes can draw children's attention to the real meaning of this day.

Today's First Reading from Isaiah is a glorious image of Jerusalem from the time of the Exile, messianic in its implications. 'Arise, shine out Jerusalem, for your light has come.' It is now the time for all nations to gather from across the world to rebuild the city. The city will become radiant with the wealth of the nations but also as a centre of faith in God, 'the Lord who rises and his glory appears'.

The relationship between this imagery and the people bringing gifts to Jesus is certainly clear. The new Jerusalem, as it were, is the home of God, still a manifestation of the Old Law but now linked through these readings to the manifestation of the New Law in Jesus.

The psalm we have just sung reiterates this image but this time focussing on the king himself who will be worshipped one day by every nation on earth. There is a messianic flavour to the psalm as it looks ahead to the king's son who will bring peace, prosperity and right judgement but who will also save the poor and the weak.

So, what is epiphany about? It is about making Jesus known to the world. Epiphany is not only something that happened 2000 years ago. Epiphany continues to happen: 'Go out to all the world,' Jesus said, 'and preach the good news'.

The apostles once asked Jesus where his home was: 'Master where do you live?' His simple response? 'Come and see'.

Like the wise men, we come and see and what we see changes our lives – we don't go home via the same road but take a different and new path back to our homes. Our encounter with Jesus changes everything – our lightbulb moment brings with it a new understanding. For us, the Gospel is our new pathway – it will always be good news; it will always be an epiphany.
