11th August 2024 THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

A reading from the First Book of Kings 19:4-8

Elijah went into the wilderness, a day's journey, and sitting under a furze bush wished he were dead. 'Lord,' he said 'I have had enough. Take my life; I am no better than my ancestors.' Then he lay down and went to sleep. But an angel touched him and said, 'Get up and eat.' He looked round, and there at his head was a scone baked on hot stones, and a jar of water. He ate and drank and then lay down again. But the angel of the Lord came back a second time and touched him and said, 'Get up and eat, or the journey will be too long for you.' So he got up and ate and drank, and strengthened by that food he walked for forty days and forty nights until he reached Horeb, the mountain of God.

R. Taste and see the goodness of the Lord.

Second Reading

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians 4:30 - 5:2

Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God who has marked you with his seal for you to be set free when the day comes. Never have grudges against others, or lose your temper, or raise your voice to anybody, or call each other names, or allow any sort of spitefulness. Be friends with one another, and kind, forgiving each other as readily as God forgave you in Christ.

Try, then, to imitate God, as children of his that he loves, and follow Christ by loving as he loved you, giving himself up in our place as a fragrant offering and a sacrifice to God.

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 6:41-51

The Jews were complaining to each other about Jesus, because he had said, 'I am the bread that came down from heaven.' 'Surely this is Jesus son of Joseph' they said. 'We know his father and mother. How can he now say, "I have come down from heaven"?' Jesus said in reply, 'Stop complaining to each other. 'No one can come to me unless he is drawn by the Father who sent me, and I will raise him up at the last day. It is written in the prophets: They will all be taught by God, and to hear the teaching of the Father, and learn from it, is to come to me

Not that anybody has seen the Father, except the one who comes from God: he has seen the Father.

I tell you most solemnly, everybody who believes has eternal life

I am the bread of life. Your fathers ate the manna in the desert and they are dead; but this is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that a man may eat it and not die.

I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I shall give is my flesh, for the life of the world.'

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Last Sunday the first reading began with the Hebrews complaining, or rather, muttering against Moses and Aaron, and this week in the gospel "the Jews" mutter about Jesus for saying that he is "bread from heaven". Until this point in the Bread of Life discourse the only other characters or dramatis personae are "the disciples" (Andrew and Philip alone being named) and "the crowd" (or "people" in looser translations). This appearance of "the Jews" indicates opposition, but it will become clearer only in verses 60-66 (next Sunday's pericope) that this opposition is not only from among the crowd but also from his disciples. Perhaps homilists are now complaining too, wondering why we must spend four Sundays on a discourse that already appears to be repeating itself.

Repetition is a distinctive Johannine feature in this work that is not so much a telling *about Jesus* in the mode of a linear historical report as it is a contemplative introduction *to Jesus himself* via a multifaceted poetic narrative. Many struggle with this peculiar style, especially in our obsessively analytical age that thinks only direct formulas can truly describe the world. Perhaps some of my parishioners murmur each time they hear me say "John does not tell stories in a straight line." I suspect not a few are incredulous when it is suggested they read the whole of John, preferably in one sitting, and then again and again, until in a sense they see the whole of it, seeing how in adding something each time round John builds complex images in layers,

and threads dispersed elements of a story throughout the whole work. The many layers in a sense allow a play of colour, the whole creating a precious opal. Or like a patchwork quilter, John has divided a few stories into pieces and sown them together in a more complex pattern revealing a deeper beauty in the interacting parts. According to John, the Good News is *Jesus*, but it expands thus: God the Creator loves the world he made, and sent his Son to heal it; to hear the Son (the Word) is to hear the Father and be healed; to see the Son (the Light) is to see the Father and be saved; to know the Son (the Truth) is to know the Father and be free in the truth; to be drawn to or by the Son (the Way) is to be drawn to or by the Father and to be raised, lifted, exalted; to love the Son (the Life) is to love the Father and to live our true life as children of God.

In today's pericope (6:41-51) we find three reiterations of last week's "I am the bread of life" (v.35), in "I am the bread that came down from heaven" (v.41, on the lips of the mutterers who have assembled it from elements in last Sunday's pericope), "I am the bread of life" again (v.48), and finally, "I am the living bread which has come down from heaven" (v.51, which opens next Sunday's pericope). Interlaced with these are several of John's key themes, mentioned above, with Jesus saying: no-one comes to me unless drawn by the Father; the Father sent me; I will raise them up; to come to me is to hear and learn from the Father; none but the one who comes from the Father sees

the Father (an inverted form of "to see the Son is to see the Father"); whoever believes, that is sees, hears, breathes, and "eats" Jesus, receives life. So, homilists, in peace, stop muttering; we have before us today the whole gospel writ brief.

This discourse does not, properly speaking, teach about Eucharist, yet it informs theology of the Eucharist, for that is where encounter with the Word Incarnate is expressed and manifested sacramentally. It should also inform missiology: as Christ, the Bread of Life, entered the world to bring it life in fullness, so also are we, his followers, to engage in the world and feed it. It should be no surprise that from at least Origen the story of the multiplication of the loaves and the feeding of the multitude has been interpreted as Jesus teaching the apostles to be teachers of the Word and so ministers of the Gospel. A question for us then is: in what way are we, Christ's followers, God's Bread for the world? But remembering that bread is composed of many grains, this is a question aimed at each parish community as a whole. Individually we are to be as leaven, quietly working to improve the world, society, from within, but some tasks belong to the whole body. Such work, or mission, engages the members together, which therefore nurtures the community itself, to do what they cannot do alone, and this enables works of greater impact to be undertaken. Works vary according to need, from receiving and sheltering refugees, liberating all manner of captives and the oppressed, to welcoming and uplifting the poor.
