MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR THE WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE CARE OF CREATION

Let us begin with a question, one perhaps without an immediately obvious answer. If we are truly believers, how did we come to have faith? It is not simply because we believe in something transcendent, beyond the power of reason, the unattainable mystery of a distant and remote God, invisible and unnameable. Rather, as Saint Paul tells us, it is because the Holy Spirit dwells within us. We are believers because the very love of God "has been poured into our hearts" (Rom 5:5) and the Spirit is now truly "the pledge of our inheritance" (Eph 1:14), constantly prompting us to strive for eternal goods, according to the fullness of Jesus' authentic humanity.

The Spirit enables believers to be creative and pro-active in charity. He sends us forth on a great journey of spiritual freedom, yet one that does not eliminate the tension between the Spirit's way of thinking and that of the world, whose fruits are opposed to each other (cf. *Gal* 5:16-17). We know that the first fruit of the Spirit, which sums up all the others, is *love*. Led by the Holy Spirit, believers are children of God and can turn to him with the words "Abba, Father" (*Rom* 8:15), just as Jesus did. Moreover, they can do so with the freedom of those who no longer fall back into the fear of death, for *Jesus has risen from the dead*. This is our great hope: God's love has triumphed and continues

to triumph over everything. Indeed, even in the face of physical death, future glory is already assured for those who live the new life of the Spirit. Nor does this hope disappoint, as was affirmed in the recent *Bull of Indiction* of the forthcoming Jubilee.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

A reading from the prophet Isaiah 50:5-9

The Lord has opened my ear. For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle.

The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed. My vindicator is here at hand.

Does anyone start proceedings against me? Then let us go to court together. Who thinks he has a case against me? Let him approach me. The Lord is coming to my help, who dare condemn me?

Responsorial Psalm Ps 114: 1-6, 8-9

R. I will walk in the presence of the Lord, in the land of the living.

I love the Lord for he has heard the cry of my appeal; for he turned his ear to me in the day when I called him.

They surrounded me, the snares of death, with the anguish of the tomb; they caught me, sorrow and distress. I called on the Lord's name. O Lord my God, deliver me!

Second Reading

A reading from the letter of St James 2:14-18

Take the case, my brothers, of someone who has never done a single good act but claims that he has faith. Will that faith save him? If one of the brothers or one of the sisters is in need of clothes and has not enough food to live on, and one of you says to them, 'I wish you well; keep yourself warm and eat plenty,' without giving them these bare necessities of life, then what good is that?

Faith is like that: if good works do not go with it, it is quite dead. This is the way to talk to people of that kind: 'You say you have faith and I have good deeds; I will prove to you that I have faith by showing you my good deeds - now you prove to me that you have faith without any good deeds to show.'

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 8: 27-35

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said, 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked, 'who do you say I am?' Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him. And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this guite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.' He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save

GOSPEL REFLECTION

The opening line of the first reading (Isa 50:5-9), concerning the opening of the ear of the Lord's servant, echoes a theme from last Sunday. This apparent link is, however, coincidental, for here the phrase is an idiom for teaching, thus meaning the Lord taught me, as is made clear by reading the verse preceding the Lectionary's pericope. As the reading unfolds we hear that what the servant has been taught is not received by way of a verbal message but by way of the experience of hardship imposed as a consequence of sin. The sin is not the servant's own, but he accepts the punishment, knowing it results from the sins of his people; he maintains his innocence through the affliction. It is no surprise that the Church reads in this passage reference to Christ, the son and servant who, though innocent, suffers the consequences of all people's sins.

People often expose an innate belief that personal misfortune comes as a consequence of personal sin. In difficult times some ask "What did I do wrong?", but less as a protest of innocence and more in conviction that there must be some

overlooked wrong. Others, in the face of disease, protest, saying in various ways "But I did the right things!" or "I did not do the wrong things!", often betraying a sense that they are entitled not to be subject to the experience of which they complain. In such cases they suffer not for sin, neither personal nor as a consequence of others' wrongdoing, but for the shared frailty of the human condition, little knowing that the genetic heritage that protects individuals in one situation may prove insufficiently protective, or possibly destructive, in another. In other cases suffering is clearly due to one's own folly or wrongdoing, or to that of others. It is the latter case that both Isaiah and Mark acknowledge in the horror of the suffering of the innocent. It is evident in the world where many people suffer and die through no fault of their own, but due to the iniquity of others. Close to home are those such as children ill-treated by parents or other adults, and further away are those displaced by war or in flight from persecution. The sin for which they suffer is multiplied and their own suffering is compounded when others treat them as a nuisance, and worse, when the indifference of world powers permits

the growth of predatory trafficking, the ensuing war on all "people traffickers" then inflicting even more harm on the already injured now caught between profiteering "helpers", unwelcoming would-be havens and unhelpful countries. If the affirmative answer to the question, "Did you convey persons away from their place of suffering?", especially if risk is involved, can earn the condemnatory label "people trafficker", a label properly applicable only to those who convey others to suffering in the like of prostitution and slavery, then Christ—who conveys us in himself from slavery to sin, through the cross and death, to new life—is condemned by his own good actions.

There is nothing good to be gained in acclaiming Christ while denying his cross, but neither should this be so spiritualised as to rob it of effect in the current suffering of real people. When we say to refugees, "Stay there, and keep safe! We wish you well" without giving them the necessities of life, then what good is that? A want of good actions demonstrates a lack of faith and a denial of the cross, and therefore of Christ himself, regardless of what our lips say in his honour.
