From Bishop Paul:

Last Sunday, the Victorian Government announced a further easing of restrictions on gatherings in the context of the coronavirus pandemic.

From next Monday (June 22nd), places of worship can open for private worship or small religious ceremonies for up to 50 people, plus those reasonably required to conduct the ceremony, in each separate area.

So, for example, we could have up to 50 people plus ministers gathered for a Sunday or weekday Mass in spaces where this can be done observing the one person per four square metre rule.

The current requirements for cleaning between ceremonies and for recording the name and contact phone number for each attendee will continue.

School News



Prep students are comparing quantities between 1 and 10 and what amount is more or less than. They have started to compare length using words like long, longer and longest.

Year 1-2 classes have completed a unit of work on information reports. The students learnt that an information report requires many parts - headings, labels, facts and diagrams. To conclude their learning the students made an information book on their favourite animal. These ranged from chickens to a reticulated python!

This week Year 3-4s are increasing their knowledge around the main idea when reading. They have made some posters to help with their learning.

Our Year 5-6 students are understanding that even famous authors need to proof-read and edit their writing many times before it can be published.

On Mondays our secondary students use this day to develop concepts using the STEM approach. short for STEM is Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. This week the students needed to work together to design, create, make and then reflect on how they could make a paper plane fly while holding four erasers. The second project involved creating a piece of furniture made from paper that could hold the weight of what it is made for. While some groups dreamed big others realised that smaller creations would be stronger.

DID YOU KNOW?

In the early days of Robinvale, Mass was celebrated in the old hall, once a month by a priest from St Patrick's Manangatang Parish. Robinvale was then part of the Manangatang Parish. Before the services, the parishioners had to clean up the hall after the previous night's dance or pictures. Fr. Duggan had the foresight to see that land was purchased for the Church. Funds were raised through many activities including wheat growing and finally St. Mary's Church, now 'The Hall' opposite St Mary's School used by the Robinvale District Health Services Early Years Program, was built and opened in 1955. It was at this time Robinvale St Mary's became its own parish.

Now St Patrick's Manangatang has become part of the Robinvale Parish.
