Dear Friends; The gospel contains two parables: the scattered seed growing of itself and the mustard seed. What is common between the two? Both speak of small and insignificant seeds. But when they sprout and grow, these smallest of seeds become the largest of plants. The parables tell us about how the kingdom of God grows in the heart of human beings. They explain the nature of God's kingdom. They show us how God's Kingdom begins in an ordinary circumstance and matures gradually in the course of time. It tells us at least two things. First one, a big thing comes from small beginning. The ordinary can become a special one. Even if we are small or insignificant, we are valuable in God's eyes. Whatever we have, no matter how ordinary we are, we can offer ourselves and contribute a lot towards God's Kingdom, Whatever we are, unskilled or average, God can uses us to make a difference. In God's eyes no one is unnoticed or forgotten. Everyone is special and important. Second one is; growth, change or improvement is a law of life. We cannot remain where we are, passive or stagnant. But not to go forward or not to progress, means is to go backward. We can grow and shine. We can achieve and improve. We should neither resign to our condition nor rely on luck. We can be better and we can give our best. God never leaves us or gives up on us. He gives everything we need to move forward in life and grow in God's grace. Go even moves people to help us. God always gives us fresh hope, another chance and new opportunities so that we can grow and renew our lives. So let us take the opportunity that God's gives us to grow in our faith journey and shine or radiate the light of Christ to the people who are not part of the kingdom of God. -Neville

This Message came from Bishop Paul:

Hello Everyone, The Victorian Government has announced an easing of COVID restrictions to take effect from midnight on Thursday June 10. The following provisions will apply in **regional Victoria**. **Religious gatherings and ceremonies** will be permitted for up to **75 people** per venue, with a density quotient of 1 person per 4 square metres. **Funerals** will be permitted with no more than **75 people** attending, plus those necessary to conduct the funeral. **Weddings** will be permitted with no more than **20 people** (including the two persons being married, the celebrant and two witnesses). **Face coverings** must still be carried at all times. Face coverings must be worn inside the church and must also be worn outdoors where 1.5 metres distancing cannot be maintained.

There will be no restrictions on travel within regional Victoria.



Gospel Mk 4:26-34

The mustard seed, the smallest of all the seeds, grows into the biggest shrub of all.

Jesus said to the crowds, 'This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man throws seed on the land. Night and day, while he sleeps, when he is awake, the seed is sprouting and growing; how, he does not know. Of its own accord the land produces first the shoot, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the crop is ready, he loses no time; he starts to reap because the harvest has come.'

He also said, 'What can we say the kingdom of God is like? What parable can we find for it? It is like a mustard seed which at the time of its sowing in the soil is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet once it is sown it grows into the biggest shrub of them all and puts out big branches so that the birds of the air can shelter in its shade.'

Using many parables like these, he spoke the word to them, so far as they were capable of understanding it. He would not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything to his disciples when they were alone.

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

A peasant in Galilee would hope for a return of 7:1 when sowing seed for a crop. So when Jesus pictures the Kingdom of God as a wonderful harvest (returning 100:1 as he put it in another parable), his peasant listeners would envisage a future without hunger, without servitude to rapacious landlords and money-lenders. A true liberation (such as Mary sang of in the Magnificat)!

Naturally, they and we want to know when this new way of life, this fulfilling of the Kingdom of God, will come about. Our Lord replies: 'Be patient. Your job is to sow the seed. Something will happen out of all proportion to your part in the process, just like the disproportion of the mustard seed to a mustard bush' (which he exaggerates into a tree sheltering birds).

God's creative power worked in the depths of stony ground of the tomb to raise up the Gospel Seed who is Jesus Christ. From that, a community has grown which, at its best, leads to a fair and just distribution of the world's resources, as Pope Francis insists is a major test of authenticity of our claim to be Christian.

We could take a moment to pray for the courage to sow the seed of the Gospel whenever an opportunity presents itself, and the patience to await the germinating power of the Resurrection to create the Tree of Life such that all peoples 'can shelter in its shade'.

First Reading Ez 17:22-24
