Dear Friends,

Jesus' two parables about poor vision refer to the proverb: Without vision the people perish! (Proverbs 29:18). What can we learn from the image of a blind guide and a bad eye? A bad eye left untreated will cause a lot of trouble that will only end in Misery. And a blind guide can also end in misery and disaster. We can only help and teach others what we have learned and received from wise teachers and guides. And how can we help others overcome their faults if we are blinded by our own faults and misperceptions? We are all in need of a physician who can help us overcome the blind spots of our own weaknesses and ignorance.

The Gospel of Luke was written by a disciple who was trained as a physician. Luke, with keen insight, portrays Jesus as the good physician and shepherd of souls who seeks out those who desire healing, pardon, and restoration of body, mind, and spirit. Jesus came to free us from the darkness of sin and evil. Like a gentle and skilful doctor, Jesus exposes the cancer of sin and evil in our lives, so that we can be set free and restored to wholeness. A key step to healing and restoration requires that we first surrender to the physician who can heal us. Jesus is our great Physician because he heals the whole person - soul and body, mind and heart - and restores us to abundant life in his everlasting kingdom.

Sir 27:4-7

A reading from the book of Ecclesiasticus

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

A person speaks from what is in his heart.

Jesus told a parable to his disciples, 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'


